Faculty Profile

J. KEVIN WATERS, SJ

After a long, hard day at the office, many people choose to relax by listening to a little music. But what if you're a musician, a teacher of music, who spends all day with chords, contraoctaves and compositions?

"Quiet," says J. Kevin Waters, SJ, chairman of the University's Fine Arts Department. "No sounds. When I want to relax, the thing I enjoy most is quiet."

Things haven't been all that quiet since Fr. Waters assumed the chairmanship of Fine Arts in August of 1979. Fall quarter, for the third straight quarter, the number of credit hours within the department is up—by 26 percent over fall of last year. "We're enormously happy," Fr. Waters said; "our enrollment is up and we now have 60 full-time majors in Fine Arts, which we believe is very good. We also have more and more non-majors taking our courses."

Fr. Waters, also a member of SU's Board of Trustees, began teaching

music at the University in 1969. He said the Fine Arts department now offers undergraduate degrees in three areas: visual arts, drama and music. There is also continual development and interest in the school's dance program and Fr. Waters hopes to initiate a major in dance in the near future. Currently there are eight full-time and nine part-time faculty members in the department.

In recent years it has been reported that there is a trend among college students to move away from liberal arts programs toward professional schools—with an eye on careers and future salaries. But Fr. Waters said that trend is not so evident at Seattle University.

"Often students majoring in Fine Arts come to me and ask how they are going to support themselves: I ask them what are they truly interested in doing? Most of our students are not trained to become professional artists. And that's simply because of the numbers. There are just not enough positions available. But our students are entering the program informed, with their eyes open."

"If our school does its proper job, and that is teaching students how to use their creative energies and gain a deep security about themselves, we are fulfilling one of the major goals of education—helping people find out who they are. And if you have those kinds of securities you will have a better focus on what you want to do

or be in your life, no matter what it is."

Holder of a master's degree in philosophy with emphasis in aesthetics, and a doctorate in music theory, Fr. Waters is currently teaching a course entitled "Survey in Western Music." He said he greatly enjoys the course because it allows him to combine material from both areas of his graduate work. Fr. Waters is also working in a tutoring program with the St. Louis Jesuits, nationally known liturgical musicians now on campus. And he is conductor of the Fine Arts Ensemble, the University's chamber group.

Never one to sit idle, Fr. Waters is an acclaimed composer in his own right. His numerous works include "The Mask of Hiroshima," a musical drama that premiered at the University of Santa Clara; "Job," a dramatic version of the biblical account; and an original opera, "Dear Ignatius, Dear Isabel," written for the 125th anniversary of Loyola College in Maryland. Much of Fr. Waters' work is produced with his frequent collaborator, Ernest A. Ferlita, SJ, from Loyola University of New Orleans.

Fr. Waters has recently received another most significant honor. This summer he was named Director of the prestigious Jesuit Institute for the Arts (JIA), an international organization that sponsors a number of Jesuit and lay artists in a variety of art programs across the country. He will serve as director of JIA for a three-year term.

Just like the present, the future looks anything but quiet for Fr. Waters.

G. Robert Truex, Jr., chairman and chief executive officer of Rainier National Bank, is also a director of the Washington State China Relations Council, advisory board chairman of the University of Washington Graduate School of Business and a trustee of the Seattle Art Museum.

Nancy Skinner Nordhoff, a civic leader who is active in numerous community and volunteer efforts, is a trustee of the Northwest Kidney Center, the Skinner Foundation and chairs the volunteer bureau for the United Way of Seattle/King County.

President of University Enterprises in Seattle, John K. Blume participates in a number of business and community activities, and in 1978 was appointed to the Archdiocesan Pastoral Council by Catholic Archbishop Raymond Hunthausen. He is also the former president of the Seattle Auto Dealers Association.

Seattle University's Board of Trustees, the University's governing body, consists of 16 members. Trustees serve four-year terms. Current chairman of the Board of Trustees is Robert D. O'Brien, chairman of the Univar Corporation.

ALL TIME RECORD FOR ENROLLMENT

For the second straight year the University's enrollment has reached an all-time record number with 4,380 students registered for fall quarter classes.

The Registrar's Office reports that the fall enrollment surpasses the previous high of 4,220 students set winter quarter of last year.



Gleed Lecture Attracts Business Community

Dr. David L. Kurtz, Thomas F. Gleed Professor of Business and Finance at Seattle University, delivered the Inaugural Lecture marking the school's first endowed chair on October 31.

Dr. Kurtz' lecture topic was "A Contemporary Perspective on Pricing Strategy."

Holder of the first endowed chair in Seattle University history, Dr. Kurtz is a renowned authority in the marketing field. He has written or co-written 12 college textbooks and more than 40 articles in professional and scholarly journals. Dr. Kurtz has a major impact on the teaching of business administration at colleges across the nation since the publication of his first text in 1974. Today more than 150,000 marketing and business students use his textbooks.

Despite his reputation as an author, Dr. Kurtz still considers teaching his primary responsibility. At Seattle University he will teach undergraduate and graduate courses in marketing and present regular public lectures and seminars. Dr. Kurtz holds BA, MBA and Ph.D. degrees and in 1974 was named the Ian Potter Foundation Fellow in Marketing at the Caulfield Institute of Technology in Australia. A professor of marketing at Eastern Michigan University before coming to SU, Dr. Kurtz will hold the Gleed Chair for a three-year term.

The Thomas F. Gleed Chair of Business and Finance in the Albers School of Business at Seattle University serves as a memorial to the prominent Seattle businessman who was president of Seattle First-National Bank, president of Simpson Timber Co. and a long-time supporter of Seattle University.

Among the donors to the endowment fund for the Gleed Chair were PACCAR Inc., and The Boeing Company, SAFECO, UAL Inc. and Seattle First-National Bank. The contributions were added to a bequest from Mr. Gleed's estate to form the endowment.

University Foundation To Administer Deferred Gifts

The University's Board of Trustees has approved the incorporation of the Seattle University Foundation. The foundation will receive deferred gifts for the University, act as a trustee for gifts made in trust and administer the planned gifts program.

Deferred gifts, when made in exchange for an annuity, and gifts interest, which pay a life income to the donors, require careful attention and administration. Because income payment to the donors is an essential aspect of deferred gifts, the monitoring of trust and annuity fund assets is extremely important. With the incorporation of the Foundation, this administrative obligation will be transferred to the Foundation. Gifts made to and received by the Foundation will be transferred to the University when the terms of the gift contracts have been fulfilled.

The Trustees adopted a resolution making all gifts received by the University through bequest in wills and the fulfillment of all deferred gift contracts part of the University endowment, unless the donor requests otherwise. This assures donors their gifts will continue to provide support to the University in the future.

Foundation directors are: Richard Bangert, Chairman of Pacific National Bank of Washington; Joseph M. Gaffney, '67, partner in the law firm of Foster, Pepper and Riviera; and Robert Sheeran, Vice President and Manager of Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith, and trustee and regent of Seattle University.

Memorial Scholarships Established For Business and Education

The John C. Erickson Memorial Scholarship was presented to the first recipient, Christina O'Toole, a Seattle University junior.

The award was presented on September 20 by Douglas Dodds of Dodds Engineers, Bellevue, and Mrs. Barbara Erickson, widow of the late John C. Erickson.

A steering committee headed by Douglas Dodds, George Walker of Walker and Associates, and Joseph Colcord of the American Congress of Surveying and Mapping (ACSM), met to establish the scholarship in 1979. Donations were received from the Land Surveyors of Washington, the American Congress of Surveying and Mapping, and private engineering and surveying firms, to perpetuate John Erickson's commitment to Land Surveying and Engineering. Erickson, who died in August, 1978, attended Seattle University. He devoted time and effort to improving educational and professional ideals within the field of engineering.

Generated income from the scholarship is granted to a Seattle University sophomore or junior majoring in Civil Engineering. Selection of a qualified student is determined by the Dean of Science and Engineering and members of the Erickson Scholarship Committee.

Interested benefactors wishing to contribute to this memorial scholarship should contact the Seattle University Alumni Association or Development Office.

A scholarship for Montessori students at Seattle University has been established in the name of William J. Codd, SJ, noted SU educator and former director of the school's Montessori Studies Center.

The scholarship, begun by Fr. Codd's family, will commemorate the priest who was a long-time SU faculty member in the Departments of Psychology and Education. Fr. Codd died on July 20 of this year after a long illness.

Fr. Codd was one of the founders of the Montessori Studies Center at Seattle University and was noted for his work and expertise in the Montessori method of instruction.

Funds from the scholarship will be used to create a merit award for Montessori students, The William J. Codd, SJ, Memorial Scholarship. The scholarship will be granted annually, beginning in academic year 1981, to a most deserving student in his or her last year of study. Selection of a qualified student will be determined by a committee composed of the Dean of the School of Education, the Director of Montessori Education, and a faculty member chosen by the Dean.

FR. JAMES B. MC GOLDRICK HONORED FOR 50 YEARS AS JESUIT

The McGoldrick Student Development Center was named in his honor in 1976 and a bust of him is on display in the University's Lemieux Library.

Fr. McGoldrick served as Dean of Seattle College until 1943 when he was named head of the Psychology department. In 1961 Fr. McGoldrick was appointed professor of educational psychology. Later, he was named dean emeritus.

Among Fr. McGoldrick's many accomplishments are his successful efforts to admit women to Seattle University in the 1930's, a first for a Jesuit institution; his co-authorship of the textbook "Fundamental Psychology" in 1953; and his private tutoring of Emile Wilson, Seattle University's first Rhodes Scholar in 1976.

He was honored with a King County proclamation as King County's first citizen, on September 28 the day of his celebration, as a man who "for the past forty-nine years, has served as an inspiration to the thousands of students who have attended Seattle University. He has been the embodiment of the rich traditions and spirit of Seattle University. Today, many of his friends, admirers and colleagues have gathered to celebrate the priest and his fifty years of priestly service."

James B. McGoldrick, SJ, who has played an important part in Seattle University's growth since 1931, celebrated his 50-year Golden Jubilee as a priest in September.

Fr. McGoldrick, Dean Emeritus, came to Seattle University in 1931 when the school was still known as Seattle College. He became the first dean of the college in 1933 when the student body numbered 35 and there were five faculty members.

One who has contributed much to the history of Seattle University, Fr. McGoldrick has been teacher, counselor and friend to countless students and others in the community over the last half-century.

In many ways, Fr. McGoldrick is a "living legend" at Seattle University.

This summer, twenty-two years after the founding of Seattle University's Honors Program, alumni from throughout the program's history gathered for a reunion.

Alumni from 1958, when the program started to current students, gathered at the picnic, held July 26 at the Bellevue provincial house of the Sisters of Saint Joseph of Peace. More than 80 graduates of the two-year Humanities Honors Program and the one-year General and Senior Honors Programs of past years. Current and past Honors faculty members attended the picnic, along with alumni families

Honors graduates and former teachers came from throughout Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Alaska, Minnesota, Missouri, Kansas and New York City, to reunite with old classmates, to share their post-Honors experience with younger alumni and current students.

The Advisory Council of Honors Alumni will devote itself to promoting contact between graduates and current students, recruiting new students for the program, making recommendations for evaluation and development of the program, and planning additional periodic reunions.

The Honors Program combines tutorial, dialogue and seminar approaches that have characterized the most successful educational programs since the time of Socrates, tapping especially the Jesuit and English Traditions. The program is under the direction of Sr. Rosaleen Trainor.



Fr. Codd was also one of the founders and later director of the Montessori Studies Center and was noted for his work and expertise in the Montessori method of instruction.

A graduate of Gonzaga High School in Spokane, Fr. Codd received his A.B. and M.A. degrees from Gonzaga University. He was awarded a Ph.D. in Education from the University of Washington in 1958.

Fr. Codd was a licensed psychologist and a member of the American Educational Research Association, the American Association of University Professors, the Jesuit Educational Association, Phi Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta Pi and the Association Montessori Internationale.




"Wish I could—maybe next year"
