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

GENERAL INFORMATION

LATE REGISTRATION—Students registering after June 20 will be charged a fee of \$1.00 for the first day of classes and 50 cents for each additional day. No student will be permitted to register after the first week of instruction.

LENGTH OF CLASSES—Classes will run a full 60 minutes in length, with a ten-minute break between classes. The first morning class will commence at 8:00 A.M.

APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION—Admission to the summer session is granted NEW STUDENTS upon the presentation of a uniform application blank, which should be filed with the registrar as far in advance as possible, preferably by the first of June. Freshmen not presenting satisfactory entrance credentials must pass an examination in subjects so chosen as to satisfy specific admission requirements.

COLLEGE TRANSFER STUDENTS—Must file a certificate of honorable dismissal from the college attended and an official transcript of all college credits.

TRANSIENT STUDENTS—Students who wish to attend the Summer Quarter only, and who give evidence of being prepared to resume college work will be accepted without the necessity of filing complete credentials. A statement indicating honorable dismissal and good standing from the last college attended will be sufficient. Students entering directly from high school are not eligible for transient standing.

REGISTRATION—Upon receipt of a NEW STUDENT'S completed application blank, the registrar notifies him of his acceptance or rejection. If accepted, the new student may register any time during the above stated registration period. Registration for all students from June 1 to June 11 inclusive. Office hours: 8:00 to 4:30 Monday through Friday; 9:00 to 12:00 noon Saturdays.

EMPLOYMENT—On campus, a full-time placement bureau serves as a clearing-house between employers and prospective student employees. Seattle University's proximity to downtown Seattle enables convenient transportation for employed students.

LIBRARY FACILITIES—The library will be open on all class days from 8:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and from 6:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. (except Friday evening), and on Saturdays from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The main Seattle Public Library is nine blocks from the university.

VETERANS' INFORMATION—Seattle University is approved by the State Board of Education for Veterans' Training. Men and women who are in the military service after June, 1950 may be eligible for Education benefits under Public Law 550, 82nd Congress, the Korean Veterans Bill. World War II veterans who were discharged from military service less than four years ago are still eligible for Public Law 346, 78th Congress, the World War II G.I. Bill. World War II veterans whose schooling was interrupted by recall to active duty may be eligible to continue under Public Law 346 and should contact the Veterans Administration concerning such eligibility before starting under Public Law 550.

TEACHER TRAINING—Seattle University's teacher-training programs have been approved and accepted by the State of Washington as qualifying students for the teaching certificates as granted by the State Department of Public Instruction.
