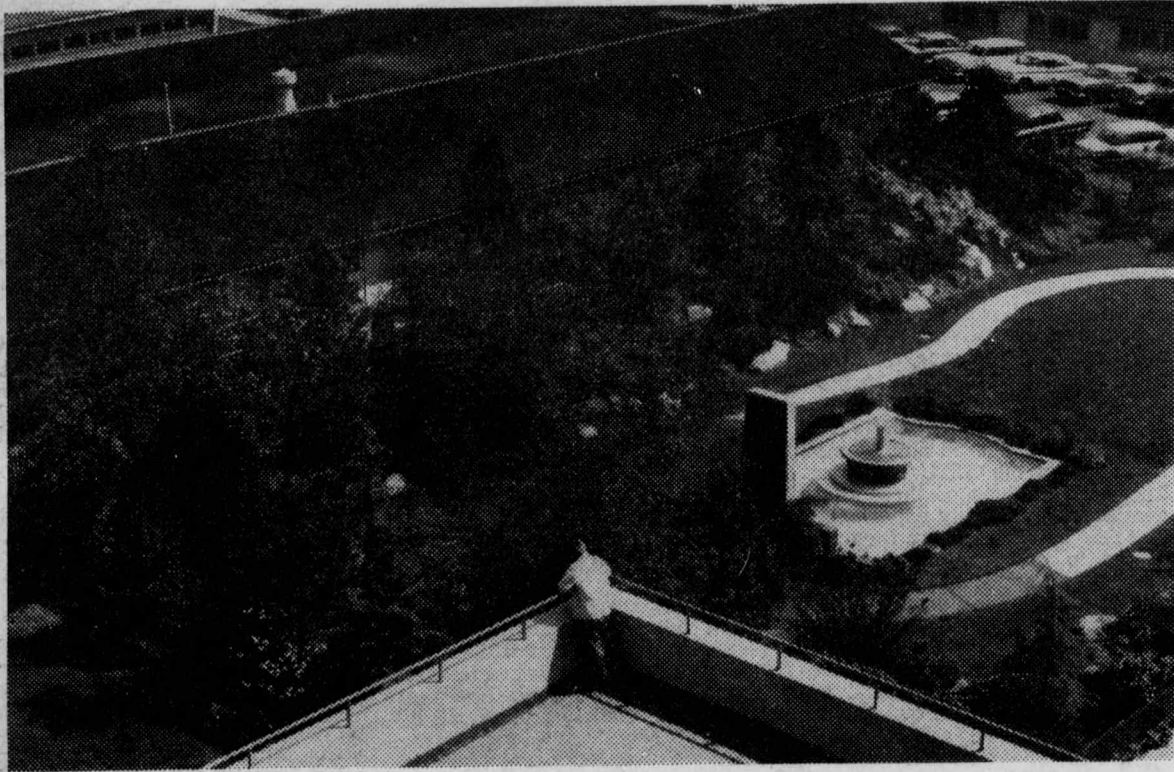

Pig Suffers, Journalists Awarded

The pink piggy bank with the sad sack eyes that sits in The Spectator office is empty now. Throughout the school year the bank has been stoically accepting the pennies of students who borrow things from the newspaper office.

This week the total reached \$72, half of which goes into a permanent scholarship fund. The other half was used for academic prizes awarded at the journalism banquet Monday.

AT THE LUNCHEON, Jim Harnish, 22-year-old senior, was named Journalist of the Year. The Mike Donohoe plaque was presented to John Campbell,

also a senior. The award was named for the former executive sports editor of The Seattle P.I. who died suddenly May 29, 1961. It was presented by Mr. Donohoe's daughter, Sheila, a junior at S.U., to the student who most typified the spirit of her father.

The Loyalty plaque went, for the second consecutive year, to Jan Kelly, a senior from Seattle. Judy King, a junior from Spokane, was given the Best Writing plaque for the second time.

Eight St. Francis de Sales plaques were awarded to students showing outstanding devotion and achievement on

school publications. The recipients were: Kathy Kleffner, editor of the yearbook; Jan Kelly, executive director of the high school press workshop; Sue Geiger, circulation manager; John Campbell, business manager; Suzanne Green, accountant; Tim Fitzgerald, photographer; Mary Elayne Grady, music and drama critic; and Randy Lump, news editor.

JOURNALISM STUDENTS in each class with the best academic records received cash awards. Those students were: Seniors: Jan Kelly and Cary Berg; juniors: Carol Caviezel and Judy King; sophomores: Patty Weld and Jim Haley; freshmen: David Verron and Sally Neault.

Honor certificates were also given to individuals for news, feature and sports stories which ran in The Spectator.

Kathy Kleffner, editor of the Aegis, and Jim Harnish, editor of The Spectator, were presented the Loyalty Cups by the Very Rev. A. A. Lemieux, S.J., president of S.U.

THE CUPS are given annually to the male and female graduate for outstanding loyalty, service and participation in student affairs.

Dr. Teller's Topic From Latest Book

Dr. Edward Teller, referred to as the "father of the hydrogen bomb," will use one of the chapters of his new book as subject matter for his talk at graduation Friday night. The book is "The Legacy of Hiroshima."

Graduation will be at 8 p.m. in the World's Fair Arena (formerly the Civic Ice Arena). The ceremonies are open to all students, parents and friends.

TELLER, WHO IS presently professor at-large of physics at the University of California, will receive a Doctor of Laws degree, honoris causa, from S.U.

The Most Reverend Thomas A. Connolly, Archbishop of Seattle, will confer the degrees.

The senior class reception will be from 8 to 10 p.m. tomorrow in the Grand Ballroom of the Olympic Hotel. The reception is for graduates and parents.

THERE WILL BE a practice for commencement for all graduates at 1:30 p.m., Friday, in the S.U. gym. It will last about 40 minutes.

Because of the traffic problem at the World's Fair site, busses will take the graduates there Friday evening. The busses will leave the gym at 7 p.m.

GRADUATES SHOULD BE in the gym at 6:30 p.m. to robe and receive their name cards. The name cards should be handed to the dean of their school before crossing the stage to receive diplomas.

Busses will take the graduates back to S.U. after the exercises. There is no charge for the busses. Only graduates will be allowed to take the busses.

Aegis Editor Named; Books Available Now

Kathy Sifferman, Seattle junior majoring in literature, will be the editor of the 1962-63 Aegis. The announcement was made at the annual's banquet at Ft. Lawton, Monday night. Twenty-seven Aegis staff members and faculty members attended the banquet.

Kathy was club editor of the annual this year. She is the secretary of the Hiyu Coulees, a Spectator reporter and a member of Sodality, Town Girls and International Club.

DISTRIBUTION of the 1962 Aegis will continue from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m., today. The office in

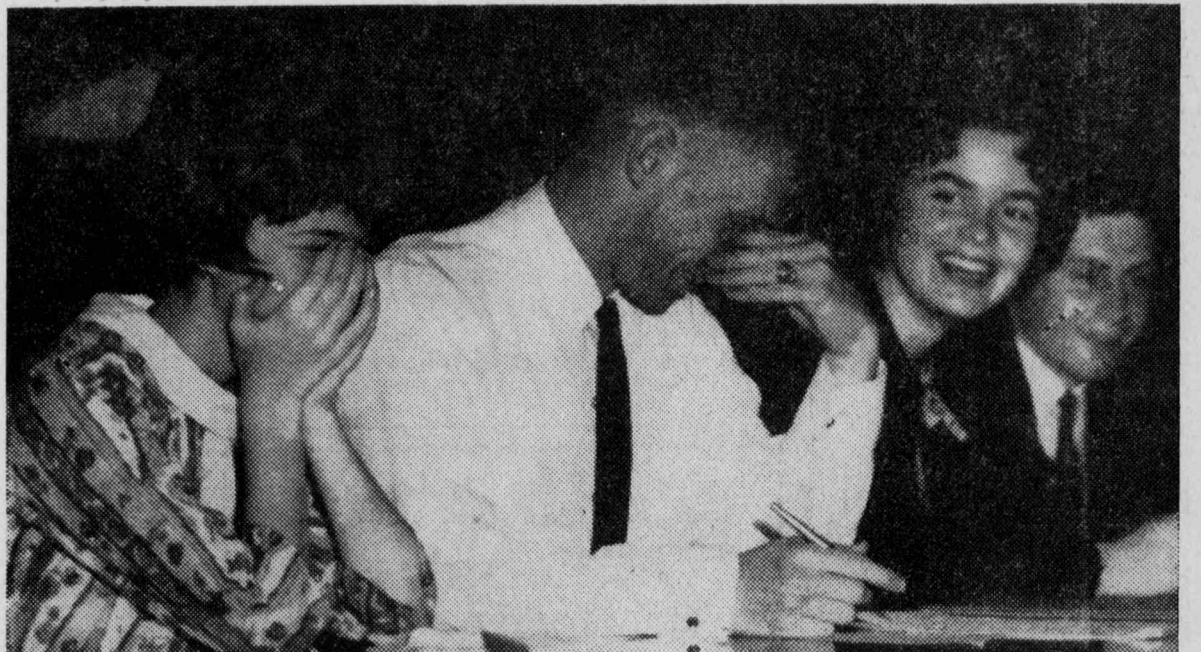

Cheers and Tears

This last issue of the 1961-62 Spectator is published with cheers and tears.

Cheers are in order probably from the staff and from some readers. For the staff, there will be no more deadline pressures, no more late hours and no more heated arguments over controversial issues published.

THE STAFF can cheer for successfully completing the big step from a weekly publication to a twice-weekly. They can cheer that they published 57 issues totaling 356 pages.

Some students will probably cheer that this year's staff is leaving, thinking that there will be no more harassments, no more snoop reporters digging out information that some would rather leave covered, no more criticism from the editorial pages and no more mistakes.

On the tearful side, the staff will sniffle at the thought that they will not be here to help inform the student body, to enjoy the challenge of publishing a paper twice a week, to have an opportunity to express opinions in print, to excite the student body into action on worth-while causes and to criticize when criticism is necessary for action.

THIS YEAR, The Spectator staff has borne the wrath of many students and some faculty members. The staff has had the courage to print opinions for all to see, no matter what the consequences. In many instances they have been chastised even by friends, for attempting to serve the student body.

The Spectator has attempted to be a fair spokesman "by and for" the students of S.U. Some may think that the paper has failed . . . others—at least staff members—feel differently.

Senate Criticized; Budget Explained

Dear Editor,

As a member of the 1961-62 Financial Board, I would like to express a few words of criticism regarding the student senate's failure to approve the executive appointments for the Financial Board of 1962-63.

Granted that the Senate has the constitutional power to approve or disapprove executive appointments; it does not appear that the esteemed Senators acted in good faith.

THE THREE APPOINTEES were duly considered and deemed qualified by the ASSU treasurer. The qualifications of these three gentlemen, all highly experienced in ASSU activities, were then presented to the Senate for consideration and approval.

It is not assumed by this writer that approvals of this nature are perfunctory. However, the Senate's action postponing consideration of the Financial Board appointees until the fall quarter not only hinders the progress of this board (which acts immediately upon the beginning of the school year), but also shows a complete lack of faith in Mr. McQuaid's judgment.

IT IS HOPED, therefore, that the Senate will, in future considerations, rely upon the judgment of the officer involved and consider the qualifications of the students interested enough to volunteer their services.

In regard to your article in last Friday's paper regarding the proposed budget for next year, I would like to make clear that this has no bearing whatever on the actual budget which will be drawn up in fall quarter next year. It has been and always will be my policy to have a balanced budget. These figures were used so that it could be clearly understood by all that it will be absolutely necessary that certain cuts be made in next year's budget to make room for additional activities (Drama club) and increased costs of running the ASSU and an enlarged cultural program. I thought that this was made clear in my report and that the main purpose of the report was to show that it would be financially unwise to join N.S.A. during the fiscal year 1962. This proposed budget will have no specific effect on the actual budget, but rather a general effect.

Chieftain Golfers Grab Spring Sports Crown

Spring sports at S.U. this year offered both satisfaction and sorrow for Chieftain backers.

Coach Tom Page's varsity golfers sported the slickest showing, with a 14-2 record. Early in the season, the linksters distinguished themselves by ranking eighth nationally in the Santa Cruz, Calif., tourney. Page's swingers scored a strong second in last month's Far West Classic in Clarkston, Idaho.

EDDIE O'BRIEN'S batmen fell apart at the seams. The stickers show a 16-11 standing, as against 20-8 last season. Sore arms, plus inadequate relief pitching and punch at the plate, were cited for the decline.

O'Brien encounters no losses on his diamond crew, so—for better or not—next year's cast will at least be familiar.

Player - Coach John Curran guided the netters to an 8-10 season against one of the strongest schedules in S.U. history. Jiro Suguro, 10-7, and Curran, 10-8, topped the win column. The same combination swept 11 of 17 doubles engagements.

on next year's roster. DeRoss Kinkade, No. 1 swinger, is the prime graduation casualty. Pete Carozzi, No. 6 man and this year's Inspirational winner, and reserve Gary Galbreath have completed their eligibility.

FROSH LINKSTERS hoping to reach varsity competition are Bill Meyer, Leroy Niznik, Jon Akin, Dick Baker and Frank Edel. Tom Storey, Doug Clark, John Shanley, Dave Uhlman and Pat O'Neil return from this year's Chiefs, which twice whipped U.W.

Sophomores Storey and Clark put up determined displays in Sunday tournament action. Storey won the top amateur award in the Bremerton Washington State Open Golf Tournament. Clark was narrowly nosed out of the Inglewood Invitational by Dick Williams, 5-4, after knocking off five other competitors. Clark potted a 70-yard putt in the 36-hole play.
